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PROCEEDINGS

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MAJORITY CHAIRMAN SAYLOR: I call the Appropriations Committee to order, and I would ask the testifiers to rise and raise your right hand.

(Whereupon, testifiers sworn en masse.)
MAJORITY CHAIRMAN SAYLOR: Thank you.

Before the Committee today is the Pennsylvania Professional Liability Joint Underwriting Association, or better known by most of us as JUA. We welcome Susan Sersha, President and CEO, and Dr. Martin Trichtinger, am I correct?

DR. TRICHTINGER: Close enough.

MAJORITY CHAIRMAN SAYLOR: Yes. And Kevin McKeon.

The budget hearing is being conducted in accordance with Act 15 of 2019, which amends the Commonwealth Administrative Code. We're here today to learn about the JUA's fiscal status and operations. We are not here to talk about past and pending litigation between the JUA and the Commonwealth. We have a short amount of time blocked for this hearing, so I would like to

start immediately with our first question. 1 Can you please briefly describe for the 2 Committee the current fiscal status of the JUA 3 and specifically provide the amount of the JUA's 4 restricted and unrestricted surplus amounts? 5 PRESIDENT SERSHA: You want the exact 6 amount, or are we just --7 MAJORITY CHAIRMAN SAYLOR: If you would 8 move the microphone a lot closer --10 PRESIDENT SERSHA: Oh, okay. MAJORITY CHAIRMAN SAYLOR: So the 11 12 stenographer can hear you. PRESIDENT SERSHA: Okay. Yes. 1.3 We just filed our annual statement with the Insurance 14 Department and the total amount of surplus is 15 \$298,276. 16 MAJORITY CHAIRMAN SAYLOR: Is that 17 millions? How much is it? 18 19 PRESIDENT SERSHA: Million, I'm sorry. \$298,276,876. 20 MAJORITY CHAIRMAN SAYLOR: Is that 21 restricted or unrestricted? 22 PRESIDENT SERSHA: Three million of that 23 is restricted. 24 MAJORITY CHAIRMAN SAYLOR: Three million 25

of that is restricted. What, do you feel, is the appropriate level of the surplus that you feel you should maintain at the JUA?

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PRESIDENT SERSHA: We -- last year, we did send a letter to the Insurance Commissioner saying that we had \$50 million of safely distributable assets. And essentially what that means is that even -- except in the most extreme situations, we don't think that we would have to tap into that amount of the surplus.

MAJORITY CHAIRMAN SAYLOR: Okay.

PRESIDENT SERSHA: It's not to say that it could never happen. You know, you can only do it to like a 98 percent certainty. I mean, with things like this coronavirus and stuff, you know, who knows, but that's our best estimate at this point.

MAJORITY CHAIRMAN SAYLOR: Very good.

I'll turn it over to Representative Bradford.

MINORITY CHAIRMAN BRADFORD: Thank you, Chairman Saylor.

Act 15 of 2019, as you know, placed certain requirements on the JUA. I'd like to ask you about the compliance in regard to some of those matters. The act specifically required JUA

to provide written budget estimates to the 1 Secretary of Budget. I'm just wondering if those 2 estimates were provided. 3 PRESIDENT SERSHA: No. 4 MINORITY CHAIRMAN BRADFORD: Another 5 question under those requirements that are 6 provided in Act 15 of 2019. The Act requires the 7 8 JUA Board to hold quarterly public meetings subject to the Board's Sunshine Act to discuss the JUA's actuarial and fiscal status. 10 Are you aware if those meetings occurred? 11 12 PRESIDENT SERSHA: Yes, they did. MINORITY CHAIRMAN BRADFORD: They did. 1.3 Can you give me dates? 14 PRESIDENT SERSHA: Let's see, it was 15 October 30th was the last one -- oh, February 16 6th. 17 MINORITY CHAIRMAN BRADFORD: 18 okay. 19 PRESIDENT SERSHA: So the October 30th one, there are minutes available, the February 20 21 6th one just occurred. MINORITY CHAIRMAN BRADFORD: Okay. 22 they were both noticed in accordance with the 23

PRESIDENT SERSHA: Yes.

Sunshine Act.

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MINORITY CHAIRMAN BRADFORD: Great. 1 Act also requires the JUA to transmit to the 2 Auditor General, State Treasurer, the Secretary 3 of Budget, and the Legislative Data Processing 4 Center a list of all of its employees. 5 Has this information been provided to 6 date? 7 PRESIDENT SERSHA: No. 8 9 MINORITY CHAIRMAN BRADFORD: How many employees does the JUA currently have? 10 PRESIDENT SERSHA: Four, including 11 myself. And I have one part-time person that has 12 been coming in to fill in because of an illness 1.3 of another employee. 14 MINORITY CHAIRMAN BRADFORD: Great. 15 PRESIDENT SERSHA: And also to help out 16 with a current -- with a recent huge workload. 17 MINORITY CHAIRMAN BRADFORD: With that, I 18 have no further questions. 19 Thank you so much for your time. 20 MAJORITY CHAIRMAN SAYLOR: Madam, you had 21 said no to two questions that Representative 22

Bradford, Chairman Bradford, had asked you, can

you tell us why those documents haven't been

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filed?

PRESIDENT SERSHA: I believe some of 1 these things require some action on the executive 2 -- we weren't asked for some of this stuff. 3 believe, like, on the budgets -- I can't remember 4 what the dates are, but at a certain point, we're 5 supposed to receive something that says the 6 format that things are supposed to be submitted 7 in and that type of thing. And quite frankly, 8 there's some technical details about how -- what information we would include that we aren't clear 10 11 on. But we thought that if we got that, if we 12 had received that format, at least that would 1.3 tell us, but we didn't get anything. And as you 14

know, we're in litigation on that issue.

MAJORITY CHAIRMAN SAYLOR: Are you working with the Secretary of Budget to get that information clarified as to exactly what --

> PRESIDENT SERSHA: No.

MAJORITY CHAIRMAN SAYLOR: -- you're presenting.

> PRESIDENT SERSHA: No.

MAJORITY CHAIRMAN SAYLOR: No.

PRESIDENT SERSHA: It's under litigation, as you are aware.
